The Morgan County Substance Abuse Council offers youth programs to before and after school programs through the YMCA, Boys and Girls Club, The Haven Youth Center, The Martinsville Youth Development Center, and WellSpring.
The Indiana Youth Institute in collaboration with the Morgan County Substance Abuse Council offers quarterly trainings for youth workers on topics related to substance abuse.

to women who are residing at their shelter. They plan to open a shelter for men in 2022.

Stability First has a women's shelter (Magdalene House) who offer substance abuse treatment

Wellspring is a homeless shelter that provides substance abuse counselling and testing to their residents.

The Martinsville Youth Development Center has a variety of prevention lessons they offer during the school year. They offer approximately 12 lessons over the course of the year. The program educates youth members that are in 5th-8th grade. The program material will focus

heavily on vaping and e-cigarettes along with drugs, alcohol, drinking and driving, and peer pressure.

The Haven Youth Center provides the Character Counts program weekly to their students in after school care for grades 5-8. Activities teach youth experience and show how their character can help them prevent making poor choices regarding alcohol, drugs, and nicotine.

Reformers Unanimous (RU) is a faith-based addictions recovery program conducted in the Morgan County Jail.

Indiana Dream Team Ministry is an 18–36-month residential ministry focused on healing men that struggle with addiction and prison environments. Indiana Dream Team is an alternative sentencing opportunity for men.

Recovery Works (Pinnacle) Martinsville just opened. They will provide comprehensive inpatient and outpatient services for adults. They plan to provide educational, behavioral and counseling programs as needed to promote the health and well-being of adults.

Churches in Mission provides the necessities for daily living to the people of Morgan County who struggle with the challenges of poverty. Many of these individuals are also affected by substance misuse concerns.

Community Risk and Protective Factors

The fund document allows the LCC to provide finances available to the coalition at the beginning of the year. The fund document gauges an LCC's fiscal wellness to empower their implementation of growth within their community. The fund document also ensures LCCs meet the statutory requirement of funding programs within the three categories of (1) Prevention/Education, (2) Treatment/Intervention, and (3) Criminal Justice Services and Activities (IC 5-2-11-5).

Please consider the following transfer from #1176 Motor Vehicle Highway Fund to #1173 Restricted Motor Vehicle Highway Fund in regards to Morgan County Highway Department.

From #1176.36107.000.0531 (Contractual Paving) \$745,111.50

Due to the recent, drastic rise in fuel and oil prices, the Waverly Park Road Cold-In-Place Recycling bid was well over the initial Engineer's estimate. While it does exceed our current line item budget for Contractual Paving, the Highway Department does have the funds that can make this project review neutral by using funds from 1176 Motor Vehicle Highway Funds Contractual Services line item. After analysis of several factors, I do recommend moving forward with the above referenced project.

The current market for asphalt services is not a temporary spike and after further discussion with multiple sources in the industry it will only go higher over the course of the next couple of years. With this in mind, it will be difficult to match the current price to complete this needed project. Delaying this work will only cause a negative impact on pricing and local community impact to traffic. The timing of this project coincides with work being completed for the I-69 project and closures can be nested to reduce overall impact.

A second option was to change the project scope and not do a full CIR, but to only mill and overlay. Upon review of price per unit bids, milling and HMA overlay of the project will still run approximately \$800,000 and require more crack seal and

patch work within a few years. Reducing the scope of the current project will substantially increase the life cycle cost of the road over the next decade and will not be the structural fix needed for this road to adequately serve the community and upcoming growth.

I have attached the numbers associated with the request I will provide the County Council to make a revenue neutral reallocation to fully fund this project. To make this reallocation work, I have pushed some items from this year to next years budget. These are all items that I have identified are needed yet not critical to our success in the highway department in the near term. Those items include additional engineering on two bridge structures this year, county wide traffic study planning and training, formation and implementation of a mitigation bank.
